It also means there is no person just like you in this world who have the same appearance, character and karma. Therefore, you are the most honored one as well as any other person.

Newborn babies will receive Shoda Kanai Shonin’s blessing and amulets. Please let him know the name of the new born baby ahead of time.

Tokudo Shiki in Hawaii

Recently I traveled to Honolulu, HI to assist my father with *Tokudo Shiki* (Taking of Precepts—first step in becoming a priest) where his disciple ceremoniously cut his hair and vowed to spread the teachings of Sakyamuni Buddha and St. Nichiren.

This was a great experience as two *Shomyo-Shi* masters came to guide and assist in the ceremony as well. Since they are knowledgeable about various ceremonies, they helped coordinate the movements so that everyone was able to conduct a wonderful service.

As overseas priests, we often conduct special services alone, thus do not have the chance to showcase some of the fine ceremonies that are available. It is only during noteworthy ceremonies, such as NONA 100th Year Celebration that many of the overseas priests meet and are able to conduct an all encompassing service. Thus it is rare for those in the congregation to experience these types of services.

Tokudo Shiki is one of these rare ceremonies, as this service is only performed when a disciple is ready to fully commit in starting the journey in becoming a Nichiren Shu priest. Those in attendance were able to experience the special vows made, cutting of the hair, and the transition from lay person (a person wearing regular clothes) to *Shami* (apprentice priest, with shaved head, wearing white robes). Upon changing, the *Shami* moves to the altar where he receives his black robes and *Kesa* (white sash) and takes a seat next to all the other priests for the remainder of the service.

As this ceremony was new to everyone, they had many questions. Such as: “What was the purpose of throwing petals as you entered the *hondo*?” “The petals falling from the sky represents *mandarava* flowers raining down from heaven, purified the area around us.”

Or, “What’s the purpose of this ceremony?” “To symbolize the *Shami* is ‘leaving home’ and removing all worldly possessions to dedicate their lives to Sakyamuni Buddha and St. Nichiren.”

Or, “This was a wonderful and meaningful service.”

For the *Shami*, this begins the long journey of further instructions before being able to finally become a Nichiren Shu priest. As I now have a new Dharma Brother, I have the opportunity to help train him in proper etiquette, movement, and most importantly, how to fold robes. This last one is the most difficult but the most important.

The robes we wear are not just accoutrements, but I considered them to be part of Buddha’s Teaching, thus something to respect and honor. When most people change out of their work clothes and into something more comfortable, sometimes those clothes are thrown on the floor and forgotten until laundry day. But with priest’s robes, we do not toss them anywhere. Even if our white robes are damp with sweat, we air dry, then properly fold for storage. Same with the black robes, we fold them properly after each use. When transporting our robes, we use *furoshiki* (garment wrapper) that we place our robes, *obis*, and *tabis* so that nothing ever touches the ground. This is how we show respect to our robes.

Not everyone can or wish to become a priest. Those who do decide to dedicate their life to the Lotus Sutra, has to commit to daily practice and humility. Many mistakes will be made and the journey rough. But in the end, all of these good and bad experiences will help shape the *Shami* into becoming a great priest, ultimately becoming a reflection of their master.
