Happy Birthday to the Buddha Sakyamuni!

According to legend, the baby Buddha, soon after his birth, stood firmly, and walked seven steps and proclaimed, “From heaven to the earth, I alone am the most honored one!” by pointing his right index finger to heaven and his left index finger to the earth. This legend was based on a recorded document that the Buddha said to a Brahman priest after his enlightenment. Even in the 21st century, there is no one like the Buddha who attained the Realty of Existence.

## **HELLO FROM JAPAN 12**

This March 11<sup>th</sup> will mark the 3<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of the Great East Japan Earthquake. Please take time on this date to pray for all the countless number of lives lost in this disaster. Your prayers will help them reach the Buddha Land.

Last October, I was invited on a pilgrimage to see the aftermath of the earthquake/tsunami. Since the area of devastation is immense, I specifically went to Iwate Prefecture, which is roughly 135 miles north of the Fukushima Nuclear Power Plant. Even after a couple of years, the devastation is still visible. Many of the houses were swept away or burned down and only the foundation remains. It is quite eerie to see vast tracks of land so desolate.

I visited remains of a school building where the water level reached the third floor, then went up to a nearby hill to see from above the same school and the devastation surrounding it. We passed by a Disaster Prevention Center where people escaped to but unfortunately no one survived as the building was only two stories and the water level reached three stories. Saw hillsides barren after all the wild fires from exploding propane tanks. Near the ocean, there are sections of broken cement pilings and twisted metal from the breakwaters that could not handle the tsunami force. We can try but we can never contain the power of Mother Nature.

There are large white tents where the debris is sifted as workers are painstakingly going through each item, seeing if they can find a special heirloom that can be reconnected to the owner. This could take several years as the pile of debris is spread over many, many acres.

The toll on the survivors is also strained. After the TV cameras and journalist leave, they are now alone, almost forgotten. Many feel guilty of surviving, depressed as the sole survivor of their family and not willing to leave their homes, living in temporary housing which is noisy and cramped, separated from loved ones as sons and daughters have left the area and other tragedies. Some are able to rebuild and move into a new home, but others are still waiting.

To see this type of devastation first hand has left quite an impact on me. TV and internet cannot show the scope of everything that has happened. Out of this great tragedy where all hope may be lost, I saw the will to survive. Many are picking up the pieces, rebuilding and incorporating the lessons learned from this ruin. I saw compassion of those volunteers coming to assist their fellow countrymen, especially a doctor who also happens to be a Nichiren Shu priest. He is helping the community cope, cheering them up, and making house calls to get those shut in out and back into society. From the bad, there is always good.

Disasters can strike anywhere. Are you prepared? Do you know what to do in an emergency? If no, then I suggest starting today and learning as much as you can. Talk to your family members and include them in this discussion. Be willing to help out your neighbors and fellow citizens in times of need. Remember, we are all bodhisattvas who have elected to come back to this world to help others. Your compassion towards them will in turn help sprout their Buddha seeds and on the path towards Buddhahood.
